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### FDA and DCA Authorizes Pharmacists to Prescribe Paxlovid, with Certain Limitations

San Bernardino County COVID-19 Provider,

Last week, the [U.S. Food and Drug Administration \(FDA\)](#) revised the [Emergency Use Authorization \(EUA\)](#) for Paxlovid (nirmatrelvir and ritonavir), authorizing state-licensed pharmacists to prescribe Paxlovid to eligible patients. There are certain limitations in place to ensure appropriate patient assessment and prescribing of the treatment. Consistent with the revised EUA, the [Department of Consumer Affairs \(DCA\)](#) has waived restrictions on licensed pharmacists independently initiating and furnishing Paxlovid to patients while being subject to conditions listed below.

- The treatment is ordered and supplied in accordance with the revised FDA EUA including:
  - Sufficient information is available, such as access to patient health records less than 12 months old or consultation with the patient's healthcare provider to assess renal and hepatic function; and,
  - Sufficient information is available, such as access to health records, medical history, or consultation with the patient's healthcare provider to obtain a comprehensive list of medications, including over-the-counter medications the patient is taking to screen for potential drug interactions with Paxlovid;
- The pharmacist should refer the patient for a clinical evaluation with a physician, advanced practice registered nurse, or physician assistant licensed under state law to prescribe drugs if any of the following apply:
  - Sufficient information is not available to assess renal and hepatic function;
  - Sufficient information is not available to assess for potential drug interactions;
  - Modification of other medications is needed due to potential drug interaction;
  - Paxlovid is not an appropriate therapeutic option based on the authorized [Fact Sheet for Healthcare Providers](#) or due to potential drug interactions for which recommended monitoring would not be feasible;
- The pharmacist is certified in basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation;
- The pharmacist maintains documentation for each patient furnished Paxlovid sufficient to demonstrate compliance with the requirements of the EUA; and
- The pharmacist complies with all applicable federal and state recordkeeping and reporting requirements, including medication error and adverse event reporting requirements of the EUA.
